Billy (10)

Billy is Helen's middle child. He's a fiercely liberal, gender bending ten year old who wears a pink tube top and cut-off jean shorts with sloppy DIY make-up smeared across his face.

Illy (2)

Illy is a bumbling, heartfelt toddler who only knows how to speak two words – "Caesar Salad!"



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05. Additional Cast – Kids

DeRay Greirstein (13)

Pamela Greirstein's teenage son. Loves to listen to a hybrid of hip-hop and traditional Jewish music on his Star of David shaped headphones.

Hal Powers (7)

Brainitas's AI child. Hal is clearly a homemade robot, but the other mom's and kids awkwardly play along with Branitas's insistence that he is an actual human child.

Dolita Cougarski (14)

Milfasia Cougarski's apathetic and snotty tween daughter. Always on her smart phone. She has fake breasts, but she hasn't had them installed yet – keeps them in the closet. A boy crazy pop culture addict, Dolita endlessly tries to live up to her mom's expectations of fashion, flirting and femme-fatalism.

Sing and Song (10)

Mrs. Chu's androgynous twins. They both look so identical that they have to wear name tags so their own mother can tell them apart, and they're never apart. They are such twins that they often eerily talk in chorus and complete each other's sentences.



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05. Additional Cast – Dads

David Fargo (43)

Dave is the soccer dad to Helen's hockey mom. Bubbling with a Nathan Lane-esque effeminate mannerisms, he spends his days wearing an apron and singing to the plants in his flower shop that, suspiciously, never has any customers.

Ira Greirstein (54)

Pamela Greirstein's uxorious husband. He's a nerdy, henpecked Jewish accountant who is terrified of authority and allergic to breaking the rules... so the exact opposite of his gregarious, outspoken wife.

And the Rest...

Meanwhile, Milfasia's husband is incarcerated, Branitas's husband ran away, and as with the rest of her mysterious background, we have no idea where Mrs. Chu's husband is. Eventually, we learn that all the dads are in the FBI Dads. (Spinoff, anyone?)



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06. Standard Operating Procedure

Story Formula – Inherently flawed characters pushing a situation beyond the point of ridiculousness, then ramping the tension to an unbearable level and resolving with an irreverent shift of the goal posts.

Storyline Structure:

A line (Premise) – The main line will always be focused on the mission at hand. B line (Tension) – The B line will center around the more typical family/domestic concerns.

Comedic Palette – The opportunities for humor are inherent and multi-tiered. Each character represents a different angle for a joke, which allows us to compound each punchline, turning a single joke opportunity into several.

Parody, satire and skewering contemporary culture are augmented with slapstick, cerebral, awkward humor and more creative fertile ground for cross demographical comedy.

Series Heart – Family. Plain and simple. The Moms' relationships with their families provide the heart of the series.

When the Agency determines that the CIA Moms lack the teamwork skills they need to be better agents, the group is sent on an undercover mission... at a lesbian strip club. Meanwhile, Milly and Billy try to figure out what their mom Helen does all day at work.

CIA Moms vs. Yoga

In an almost dialogue-less "silent film" type episode that takes place in "real time," the CIA Moms try to take a break at a yoga studio aptly named Mamaste. Unfortunately, ninjas enter the scene, turning their relaxing session into a surprisingly hilarious bloodbath.

CIA Moms vs. Parent Teacher Night

Growing concerned that a mole might be in the CIA Moms' otherwise serene community of McLean, the Agency sends the group to their kids' charter school's Parent Teacher Night to investigate the staff there. Once at the school, the Moms must juggle their kids, their kids' erratic teachers and, of course, engage in mortal combat with a wicked witch who turns out to be none other than Betsy DeVos.

CIA Moms vs. Reality TV

In an episode that parodies a "Real Housewives" reality TV segment, the CIA Moms do their best to appear normal to their upcoming TV audience, only to end up fending off ninjas in their local grocery store. Also, we begin to learn more about the Moms' elusive husbands, and Cat Stevens refuses to get out of a tree.





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07. Future Missions – Season One

CIA Moms vs. Washington DC

After using a specialized "Buddy Cop Movie" algorithm, Milfasia and Helen take on a mission in Washington DC where the odd couple find themselves at a hobo camp made up of former ex-presidents and presidential candidates. Milly meanwhile figures out a way to con the other kids into working for a new company she's established.

CIA Moms vs. Global Warming

The CIA Moms are going to Alaska! It turns out the natives have become fed up with outside infiltrators forcing them to fight Global Warming. After all, the Alaskans WANT Global Warming so they can finally get rid of all of those pesky polar bears and wear shades, Bermuda shorts and sandals all day. Wouldn't you? Meanwhile, Sing and Song fend off a con man over the phone.

CIA Moms vs. The Bake Off

In an episode that is a knock-off of corny 80s sitcoms (complete with canned laughter), the CIA Moms get embroiled in a cookie bake off on live television that somehow turns into a pie fight... with ninjas. The kids are back home dealing with annoying new neighbor Milo Yiannopoulos.

CIA Moms vs. The Media

Helen gets in trouble when she wears an "offensive" t-shirt to her local Starbucks-Nike hybrid store and ends up an online pariah.
